"Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." (1 Corinthians 13:4-7)

The verses above are often quoted in wedding ceremonies because it tells us what love is. But the truth of the matter is that those verses are not talking about what love is as much as what love 'does'. They are more than just romantic feelings between couples, and in fact it has nothing to do with romantic feeling to begin with; but they are about actions or sacrificial love.

Those verses are part of Apostle Paul's pastoral letter in response to conflicts and divisions that the church was facing. As Christianity was getting further away from Jerusalem and more gentiles became Christians, the church faced new and complex challenges. The church had to deal with their new reality such as whether it is lawful to eat food that was being offered to the idols, a Christian marries a non-believer, a woman takes off her veil during worship or is allowed to speak in public, etc.

People treated others based on their social status. Even they went into a more extreme that some church's members sided with one apostle over the other; the followers of Paul or Apollos. Over all, it was about power or control. Paul urged them to practice love above all things.

Well, there is nothing new under the sky. The church throughout the ages always faces challenges as the church confronts its values and the values of the world or as the people of God learn to adapt into the new reality. Even with our church, especially for the last two years we are dealing with many issues and decisions; whether to have in person or online service, masking or no masking, regular communion or virtual communion, etc. There is always disagreement in every decision we make which is very normal and healthy but how we respond to our disagreements will make a difference. God gives us different gifts and we view things differently; it is God's ideas to begin with. I am sure God doesn't expect us to think the same. However, God expects our unity in spite of our uniformity; for indeed, our unity lies at the foot of the cross.

My seminary professor once said that if you would like to learn more about the church conflicts and how to approach them, read Corinthians. Paul emphasizes that above all things, choose love. He concludes, "And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three, and the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13). So let's practice that love when we face conflicts and disagreements that will not create divisions among us. As the apostle Peter also said, "Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins." (1 Peter 4:8)

"But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way" (1 Cor. 12:31).

I try to listen to teenagers, and not just my teenagers. What do they talk about? How does their conversation reveal their experiences in the world? I listen to parents as well, and try to pay attention to how they talk about their children, and their aspirations for their children. Themes of

"giftedness" often emerge among both teenagers and parents. Sometimes an unhealthy competitiveness about gifts creeps into the timbre of conversation, often revealing more about insecurity than celebration.

The church at Corinth had no problem with their version of "time, treasure and talents (gifts)" surveys and actions. Paul writes extensively to them about their life together as church. Paul affirms the "gifts" of the church, but, as Apostle and Teacher, wants to show them a "more excellent way." This way is the way of love - which we discover in 1 Corinthians 13. Sometimes the scholars' insertion of chapters and verses in scripture draw our attention away from the flow of biblical prose. Read 1 Corinthians 12:31, don't stop. Read right through chapter 13 and into chapter 14. This is a love letter from the apostle to the church.

I'd like to hear more celebration about the character of teenagers - how they care for others and share concern for the hurting. I want to lift up the teenagers' pursuit of truth - love does not "rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth." Even the most "gifted" young person in any field may or may reach a crescendo or apex of a sport or academic pathway. Such heights emphasize a narrow aspect of human endeavor. But love is a more excellent way.

Love is the character of Christ, the very personality of God as a human being. While gifts are important, love makes space for the gifts of all instead because God's gifts are never for the few, but for the common good of all. Can we learn to celebrate the development and demonstration of character, and love as something worth "pursuing," as Paul says in 14:1?

Love makes it possible to bear truth and endure the fruits of truth. Love imbues the "gifts" people have with life-giving and life-sharing service it does not insist on its own way. In the year ahead, may we learn from the church at Corinth, and the Apostle Paul to "pursue love and strive for the spiritual gifts" (14:1).

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This past Thursday, January 27th, the Church Council of Christ Lutheran Church, with guidance and support from Bishop Bill Gafkjen, discussed and voted to accept the Negotiated Resignation of Pastor Richard Gianzero. As part of this agreement, Pastor Rich will serve his final day as a Pastor at Christ Lutheran on this coming Monday, January 31st. He will be in the office from 6-8pm if you wish to stop by in person to say goodbye, or if you wish to leave a note, the office will make sure to deliver these to him.

While this may be a surprise to many of you, this is the result of months of discernment between Pastor Bimen and Pastor Rich regarding the Shared Ministry Expectations for Christ Lutheran. As they have not been able to reach agreement on this, Pastor Rich, in consultation with the Synod office, has offered to resign in respect to Pastor Bimen's role as Lead Pastor and to ensure there is no division in the church. The negotiated resignation is used in cases, such as these, where the bishop of a synod determines that there is no possibility of resolution to a situation.

The Bishop's office has pledged to continue working to support the congregation as we process this and work to address our systems to support our pastors, lay leaders, and church community moving forward. While we are working to discern our next steps forward, it is important to remember our calling as Lutherans to show grace as we work to strengthen our relationships with each other in worship and service in "Making Christ Known."



<u>LITTLE SCRIBBLING ON THE USE OF THE TERM</u> "CATHOLIC CHURCH" IN THE APOSTLE'S CREED

The use of the term 'holy catholic church' in our Apostle's Creed is often misunderstood as the Roman Catholic Church. To avoid such misunderstanding, some people substitute that term with the 'holy Christian church'. But the truth is that term does not refer to Roman Catholic Church per se. In fact, the Roman Catholic Church is part of the 'holy catholic church' that we confess in our Apostle's Creed.

The word catholic with the lowercase 'c' simply means universal, general or concerning the whole. It is derived from a compound of two Greek words put together as one "katholikos" from the words "kata" + "holos," which, when put together means "throughout all." This is found for instance in Acts where the phrase "church throughout all" is stated (Acts 9:31). The word catholic was first used in this sense in the early second century when Ignatius of Antioch declared, "Where Jesus Christ is, there is the 'catholic church."

We believe that the church is the body of Christ, where Jesus is the head and her Lord. The church is to be the body of Christ extended throughout time as well as space, the whole company of God's redeemed people



throughout the ages. Therefore, 'the holy catholic church' means the same as 'the holy Christian church' throughout the world that has nothing to do with a particular church's institution or place. We should not hesitate to use that term in our worship or you may use the alternate translation if you recite that creed if you wish; all is right and proper.
